O wind, that sings so loud a song!




I saw the different things you did,

O wind, that sings so loud a song!


O you that are so strong and cold,

- Personification Wind is spoken of like a living being
- Simile Comparison (like skirts moving)
- **Metaphor** Wind as mystery/power of nature
- Alliteration Repetition of sounds
- Symbol Wind as spirit, freedom, life force

- Wind is playful, strong, and mysterious.
- Shows the power of nature.
- Wind is compared to a child, beast, and spirit.
